B. Approval of Minutes

Motion by May, second by Neal to approve the minutes from the December 3, 2019 meeting. Motion carried.

D. Committee Director Keehner's/Deputy Director Townsend's Report

Director Keehner welcomed everyone to the meeting.

II. <u>PRESENTATIONS</u>

A. Pace Bus - Rapid Transit Program

Ryan Ruehle, Rapid Transit Corridor Planner for Pace Bus, introduced himself to the Committee. He first discussed Pace Arterial Rapid Transit service. The first Pace Pulse service is currently in operation along Milwaukee Avenue. Ruehle described some of the features that differentiate Pulse service from regular Pace service, including stops spaced at a half-mile, station amenities, branded buses, raised heated platform stations, and transit signal priority. Ruehle covered the implementation timeline for future Pulse service in the region. Future routes for Pulse service including: Dempster, Halsted, 95th, Harlem, and Cermak.

Next, Ruehle discussed the I-294 "Tri-State" Market Facilities Study. Pace is looking at making the Tri-State the "spine" of future express bus service throughout the region. Finally, Ruehle provided information on Pace's strategic plan. Ruehle reported that Pace is creating a new strategic plan that embraces the agency's role as a mobility provider throughout the Chicago region. Pace is planning for late 2020 adoption of the plan.

Henaghan asked if Pulse service on a corridor will enhance or take away the existing local bus service. Ruehle responded that the goal of Pulse is to enhance existing local bus service, as local service will still exist but at reduced frequency. May asked who the jurisdictional authorities are for implementing Transit Signal Priority (TSP). Ruehle responded that it is IDOT and CDOT.

B. Metra Update - Capital Bill Funding

Demetri Skoufis, Community Affairs Representative for Metra, introduced himself to the Committee. He provided an overview of Metra service in DuPage County and reported that Metra is not raising fares for the second consecutive year. Skoufis then discussed the funding that was allocated to Metra as part of the *Rebuild Illinois*

capital bill that was passed in the Spring 2019 legislative session. With the funding, Metra plans to purchase new railcars and locomotives, as well as expand their existing rehabilitation facility at 47th Street and the Dan Ryan in Chicago. Skoufis also discussed upcoming station work at Metra stations in DuPage County. Stations that are slated for improvements include: Elmhurst, Glen Ellyn, West Hinsdale, Westmont, Clarendon Hills, Highlands, and Itasca. Skoufis added that some of the capital bill funding will go to bridge replacement work. He concluded his presentation by stating that Metra expects to meet the federal government's deadline of having Positive Train Control in place by the end of 2020.

D. <u>DuPage County RTA Technical Assistance Application - Countywide Mobility</u>

Loper reported that DuPage County has submitted an application to the Regional Transportation Authority's (RTA) Community Planning Program, and it is listed as part of the 2020 Program of Projects. He added that there will be a role for municipalities in plan development and he will be communicating additional information as plan development begins.

E. CMAP Flood Susceptibility Index

F. <u>CMAP Study on Fines, Fares, and Fees</u>

Knickelbein reported that CMAP is undertaking a study on the impact of transportation related fines, fares, and fees on low-income people and people of color to develop potential policies to mitigate those effects. Members requested that CMAP staff come to a future Transportation Policy Committee Meeting to provide additional information on the study.

IV. UPDATES FROM TRANSPORTATION PARTNERS

A. Regional Transportation Authority

Serdiuk reported that the RTA is looking at a legislative solution to restoring operating cuts to transit.

B. <u>Pace</u>

Rose thanked Villa Park for their communications with Pace during recent construction of the Salt Creek Bridge and reported that Pace Bus 313 service has been restored to its normal route.

C. Metra

Skoufis mentioned that Ventra mobile ticketing is approaching 50 percent use for ticket sales on some Metra lines. He added that on-time performance on the BNSF line for the most recent reporting period was 97.7 %.

D. Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning

E. DuPage County

Loper stated that DuPage County has applied to the CMAP Unified Work Program (UWP) for planning for trails in DuPage County.



Federal Opportunities

Federal opportunities for funding are usually announced on <u>grants.gov</u>. The system offers a free subscription service that will email you about new opportunities and changes to your selected opportunities.

State Opportunities

The Illinois Commission on Government Forecasting and Accountability publishes an email grants alert with information on many federal and state opportunities. Click <u>here</u> for the archive or to subscribe.

The Illinois Department of Transportation usually posts changes to funding programs in Circular Notices. These notices are archived on the <u>IDOT website</u>. Local public agency partners can also subscribe for free <u>email alerts</u> of IDOT news, including publication of circular letters.

Regional and Local Opportunities

Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning announces new program rules and funding opportunities through its Weekly Updates. The archive and subscription sign up form can be found on the <u>CMAP website</u>. The Weekly Update also includes information on opportunities available from other sources including the Regional Transportation Authority, state agencies, and county and local partners.

FEDERAL PROGRAMS

Better Utilizing Infrastructure to Leverage Development (BUILD) Grants



Program Sponsor: US Department of Transportation (USDOT)

Description: This competitive grant program supports nationally significant projects that are multi-modal, multi-jurisdictional, and are more difficult to fund through traditional USDOT programs. Typical funded projects include intermodal freight improvements, interstate improvements, and transit enhancements. These grants were formerly known as TIGER grants.

Local Project Examples: The City of Chicago received funds for new bridges over Lake Shore Drive; Metra received funds for reconstructing a rail bridge on the MD-West Line.

Award Sizes: The minimum award size is \$5 million, and the maximum award size is \$25 million. Each sponsor is limited to three applications.

Eligible Phases: All phases are eligible but USDOT prioritizes projects that are ready for construction.

Timing: FY 2020 BUILD Grants are due on May 18, 2020. Since 2009, BUILD Grants have been awarded annually.

Match Requirements: For urban area projects, the sponsor must provide a match of at least 20%.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Highway, bridge or other roadway projects
- ✓ Public transportation projects
- ✓ Passenger and freight rail improvements
- ✓ Intermodal projects

Infrastructure for Rebuilding America (INFRA) Grants



Program Sponsor: US Department of Transportation (USDOT)

Description: This competitive grant program supports nationally significant freight and highway projects. Typical funded projects include major reconstructions and additions to the Interstate system, bridge reconstructions and rail tunnel projects.

Local Project Examples: IDOT received funding for the Chicago Region Environmental and Transportation Efficiency (CREATE) freight program.

Award Sizes: There are separate categories for large and small projects. Large projects must total project costs of at least \$100 million and receive a minimum \$25 million INFRA grant. Small projects have total project costs less than \$100 million and must receive a minimum \$5 million grant.

Eligible Phases: All phases are eligible but INFRA prioritizes funding construction ahead of engineering phases.

Timing: The FY 20 INFRA Grant application period closed in February 2020. The FY 21 call for proposals is subject to funding appropriations from Congress.

Match Requirements: INFRA grants may be used for no more than 60% of total project costs. Other federal funding may be used in combination with INFRA funds so that the total federal funding does not exceed 80% of total project costs.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Highway freight projects on the National Highway Freight Network
- ✓ Highway or bridge projects on the National Highway System
- ✓ Rail-highway grade crossing projects
- ✓ Intermodal facility projects

Transportation Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act (TIFIA) Loans



Program Sponsor: US Department of Transportation (USDOT)

Description: TIFIA provides credit assistance to advance transportation projects of regional and national significance. Assistance is provided as a secured loan, loan guarantee, or line of credit. Loan terms are negotiated following a financial review of the project. Terms can last up to 35 years. TIFIA interest rates are fixed at rates equivalent to US Treasury rates. Loans are repaid via tolls, fees or other dedicated revenues associated with the project.

Local Project Examples: Chicago Riverwalk, CTA 95th Street Terminal Improvement Project

Award Sizes: Projects must have a minimum capital cost of at least \$50 million (\$15 million for ITS projects). USDOT charges \$250,000 for financial and legal reviews at the Letter of Interest stage.

Eligible Phases: Any project eligible for federal surface transportation funding is eligible for TIFIA assistance. Projects must commence to construction within 90 days of approval of the TIFIA credit instrument.

Timing: Initial applications are submitted in the form of a Letter of Interest, which may be submitted at any time.

Match Requirements: Federal credit assistance is limited to no more than 33% of total costs.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Highway, bridge or other roadway projects
- ✓ Public transportation projects
- ✓ Intercity bus and rail facilities and vehicles
- ✓ Publicly owned freight rail improvements
- ✓ Port infrastructure investments

Railroad Trespassing Enforcement Grant Program



Program Sponsor: Federal Railroad Administration, USDOT

Description: This program provides funds to law enforcement agencies for programs to reduce trespassing on railways. Applicants from Illinois are given preference in the program as one of the 10 states with the highest rates of trespassing that leads to casualties. All grant funds must be used for law enforcement labor. Typical projects include dedicated patrols of railroad crossings.

Local Project Examples: No known local projects recently funded.

Award Sizes: There are no minimum or maximum award sizes.

Eligible Phases: Only labor costs, with the exception of administrative costs up to 1% of the total award.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Fall 2020.

Match Requirements: No required match.

Eligible Project Types:

✓ Enforcement of railroad trespassing laws

Pilot-Program for Transit Oriented Development



Program Sponsor: Federal Transit Administration, USDOT

Description: Funding for local governments for planning to integrate land use and transportation with new fixed guideway transit projects or core capacity projects (projects that increase transit capacity by at least 10%). Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) projects are eligible. Typical projects include planning for economic development and zoning changes around new rail stations and new BRT projects.

Local Project Examples: The CTA received funding for planning of the south extension of the Red Line; The Northern Indiana Commuter Transit District received funding for the planning of a new line for the South Shore Railroad.

Award Sizes: The minimum award size is \$250,000 and the maximum award size is \$2 million.

Eligible Phases: Planning only.

Timing: The FY 2019 Program application period closed in November 2019. Funding for 2020 is dependent on Congressional appropriations.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 50%.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Transit Oriented Development planning for new fixed guideways
- ✓ Transit Oriented Development planning for core capacity

Consolidated Rail Infrastructure and Safety Improvements (CRISI)



Program Sponsor: Federal Railroad Administration, USDOT

Description: Provides funding to improve the safety, efficiency, and reliability of inter-city passenger and freight rail services. Typical projects include new highway-rail grade crossings, rail line relocations, and railroad safety technology.

Local Project Examples: Upgrades to track of the Chicago South Shore & South Bend Railroad (South Shore Line).

Award Sizes: There are no minimum or maximum awards.

Eligible Phases: There are separate tracks for planning, preliminary engineering, construction, and railroad safety projects.

Timing: Applications are typically accepted every fall.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 20%, with preference for sponsor matches that exceed 50%.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Deployment of railroad safety technology
- ✓ Capital projects related to intercity passenger rail service
- ✓ Capital projects that alleviate rail congestion
- ✓ Highway-rail grade crossings
- ✓ Rail line relocations
- ✓ Improvements to short line rail
- ✓ Improvements to multimodal connections to rail
- ✓ Safety programs

Our Town Program



Program Sponsor: National Endowment for the Arts

Description: This program provides funding for placemaking initiatives. Proposals must be submitted by a collaboration of local government and arts organizations. Typical projects include the design and installation of public art, murals along roadways, and the development of public spaces dedicated to the arts.

Local Project Examples: The School of the Art Institute of Chicago received funding for public art installations; The University of Chicago received funding to develop a business incubator within a transit facility.

Award Sizes: The minimum award size is \$25,000 and the maximum award size is \$200,000.

Eligible Phases: These grants do not use typical phases for transportation projects.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Fall 2020.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 50%. The match may be inkind.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Arts engagement
- ✓ Cultural planning
- ✓ Design (including design of public spaces)
- ✓ Artist and creative industry support

STATE PROGRAMS

Illinois Truck Access Route Program



Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

Description: This program provides funds to local governments to upgrade roads to accommodate 80,000-pound truck loads. Typical funded projects include reconstructions of truck routes and improvements to intersections that facilitate truck traffic.

Local Project Examples: The program has not published a list of recent awardees.

Award Sizes: The program provides funding at the rate of \$45,000 per lane mile and \$22,000 per eligible intersection.

Eligible Phases: Funds may not be used for pavement preservation or maintenance. Funds may be used only for construction.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Fall 2020.

Match Requirements: State funds are limited to no more than 50% of total construction costs or \$900,000, whichever is less.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Truck route improvements
- \checkmark Intersection improvements on truck routes

Illinois Safe Routes to School Program



Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

Description: This program funds infrastructure and non-infrastructure projects that facilitate safer walking and biking to and from school facilities serving children in grades K-8. Municipalities and schools may apply for infrastructure funds. Typical funded projects include education and encouragement campaigns, costs of traffic safety enforcement near schools, and construction projects that calm traffic near schools.

Local Project Examples: Lisle received funding for construction of a sidewalk; Elmhurst received funding for education programming.

Award Sizes: The typical award size for infrastructure projects is between \$25,000-\$200,000. Non-infrastructure project awards range from \$2,500-\$50,000.

Eligible Phases: All project phases except preliminary engineering and right-of-way costs are eligible.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Fall 2020.

Match Requirements: No required match.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Infrastructure improvements near schools (within two miles)
- ✓ Traffic safety enforcement (labor and equipment) near schools
- ✓ Programs to encourage walking and biking to school
- ✓ Accessibility improvements on access routes to schools
- ✓ Evaluation of Safe Routes to School initiatives

Illinois Statewide Planning and Research Program



Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

Description: This program funds planning studies that advance goals of the state's Long-Range Transportation Plan or other plans for surface transportation. IDOT uses program funds both for support of its own internal planning studies and planning projects proposed by external partners. Typical funded projects include countywide transportation plans, feasibility studies, and plans focused on the state highway network.

Local Project Examples: The Central Council of Mayors received funding to develop a new council-wide transportation plan. DuPage County received funding for a feasibility study of the East Branch DuPage River Trail.

Award Sizes: There are no minimum or maximum awards.

Eligible Phases: These funds are limited to planning studies only.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Spring 2020.

Match Requirements: Non-federal funds must equal at least 20% of the total project costs with priority given for projects with higher levels of local match.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Planning studies
- ✓ Data purchase, collection and/or analysis
- ✓ Program development activities
- ✓ Performance management activities
- ✓ Coordination/outreach activities

Illinois Competitive Freight Program



Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

Description: This program supports efforts to improve conditions for freight movement on the Primary Highway Freight System, Critical Urban Freight Corridors, or Critical Rural Freight Corridors. Typical funded projects include reconstruction of freight corridors, improvements to truck parking, and grade separation projects.

Local Project Examples: The Village of Franklin Park received funding for a reconstruction of Franklin Avenue.

Award Sizes: There are no minimum or maximum awards.

Eligible Phases: All phases are eligible for funding. Applications for pre-construction phases must demonstrate a high likelihood that the funding of pre-construction phase will lead to delivery of a constructed project.

Timing: The timing for new opportunities is unknown.

Match Requirements: Non-federal funds must equal at least 20% of the total project costs (10% for limited circumstances for projects on Interstate highways)

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Reducing bottlenecks
- ✓ Improving freight-related safety
- ✓ Improving intermodal accessibility to/from freight corridors
- ✓ Technology deployment

Illinois Special Bridge Program



Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

Description: Provides funding for the reconstruction of deficient highway bridges under the jurisdiction of a local government. Funding is not provided for new bridge constructions, only for reconstruction of eligible existing bridges. The program does not fund preservation activities such as deck overlays.

Local Project Examples: The Village of Justice received funding for the replacement of a bridge on Archer Avenue. This program is also funding a bridge deck overlay on US 34 in Lisle.

Award Sizes: Projects must include a minimum of \$1 million in total costs (all phases).

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Fall 2020.

Eligible Phases: Only construction and construction engineering phases are eligible for funding.

Match Requirements: Non-federal funds must equal at least 20% of the total project costs.

Eligible Project Types:

✓ Highway bridge re-construction

IDOT Economic Development Program



of Transportation Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

Description: Provides funding for roadway improvements or new construction to facilitate access to a new or expanding industrial facility. The program is intended to facilitate growth in employment in those facilities and typically does not fund speculative construction activities. Typical funded projects include roadway improvements in industrial parks.

Local Project Examples: The Village of Franklin Park received funding for improvements to roadways in the Cullerton Industrial Area. The City of Wilmington received funding for traffic signal installation on Arsenal Road at IL 53, near a logistics park.

Award Sizes: This is not a competitive award program – funds are distributed based on the number of jobs created (\$30,000 per job) or retained (\$10,000 per job). The maximum funding distribution is \$2,000,000. Preliminary engineering and construction engineering costs are limited to 15% of total project costs. Funding awards are made to local governments on application, subject to funding availability.

Eligible Phases: Preliminary engineering, construction engineering and construction.

Timing: These awards are not usually made pursuant to a set cycle but are awarded as funds are available.

Match Requirements: Non-state funds must account for a minimum of 50% of total project costs on a local roadway project. On state roads, there is no required match.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Roadway improvements
- ✓ New roadway construction

Illinois Transportation Enhancement Program (ITEP)



Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

Description: This program funds projects that enhance the cultural, aesthetic, and environmental aspects of transportation. IDOT will launch a new version of the program in 2020 that supplements federal funds with new state funds from the *Rebuild Illinois* capital bill that are targeted to pedestrian and bicycle projects. New program rules are expected in Summer 2020.

Local Project Examples: The City of Park Ridge received funding for streetscape improvements on Northwest Highway. The Village of Niles received funding for pedestrian improvements to Milwaukee Avenue.

Award Sizes: New program rules are expected in Summer 2020.

Eligible Phases and Limitations: New program rules are expected in Summer 2020.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Fall 2020.

Match Requirements: There is a sliding scale for match requirements for projects utilizing state supplemental funds. For projects that are federally funded, the match is 50% for right-of-way and easement acquisition, and 20% for all other activities.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Pedestrian/bicycle facilities
- ✓ Streetscapes
- ✓ Conversion of abandoned railroad corridors to trails
- ✓ Historic preservation and rehabilitation of historic transportation facilities
- ✓ Vegetation management in transportation rights-of-way
- ✓ Stormwater management of transportation projects
- ✓ Construction of turn outs, overlooks and viewing areas

Illinois Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)



Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT)

Description: This program funds projects that reduce fatalities and serious injuries due to crashes on local roadways. Typical funded projects include the engineering and construction of safety improvements on roadways.

Local Project Examples: Program funds are currently being used for traffic signal improvements and median repair on Cicero Avenue. IL 59 in Bartlett is undergoing reconstruction using program funds.

Award Sizes: There is no minimum award size. There is no maximum award size except for guardrail projects, which are subject to a maximum award of \$1 million in federal funds.

Eligible Phases: All project phases are eligible for funding.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Spring 2020.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 10%.

Eligible Project Types:

✓ Roadway safety improvements

Illinois Grade Crossing Protection Fund



Program Sponsor: Illinois Commerce Commission (ICC)

Description: This program funds projects that reduce fatalities and serious injuries on local roadways at railroad crossings. Typical funded projects include installation of warning devices at railroad crossings, grade separations and improvements to roads approaching railroad crossings.

Local Project Examples: A grade separation project in Aurora on North Aurora Road is being funded through the program; Improvements at the Metra Station in Clarendon Hills are being funded through the program.

Award Sizes: There are no minimum or maximum award sizes. Projects anticipated to receive more than \$1 million in program funding typically must be approved via a petition for an individual order from the Illinois Commerce Commission. Smaller projects can be approved with a Stipulated Agreement with the agency.

Eligible Phases: All project phases are eligible for funding. Funds cannot be used for state roads (which are funded from a separate state account).

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in Winter 2021.

Match Requirements: There is a sliding scale for required matches from local government and railroad partner(s) depending on the type of project.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Warning device upgrades
- ✓ Grade separations new and reconstructed (including pedestrian separations)
- ✓ Highway approaches
- ✓ Voluntary crossing closures
- ✓ Crossing surface renewals

Illinois Recreational Trails Program



RESOURCES Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR)

Description: This Program provides funding for the acquisition, development, rehabilitation, and maintenance of motorized and non-motorized recreational trails. 30% of the program funds are earmarked for motorized trails, 30% are earmarked for non-motorized trails and the remaining 40% is used for a mixture of non-motorized and motorized trails Typical funded projects include extensions of existing trails, design and construction of new trails, and improvements to support facilities on trails.

Local Project Examples: McHenry County received funding for off-road motorized trail improvements.

Award Sizes: The maximum grant award is \$200,000 for non-motorized trail projects and there is no maximum award size for motorized trail projects. There is a non-refundable application fee equal to ¹/₄ of 1% of the grant request (minimum \$100 and maximum \$300).

Eligible Phases: All project phases are eligible for funding. No more than 15.25% of planning and construction management costs may be reimbursed by the program.

Timing: The next call for proposals closes in March 2020.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 20%.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Trail construction and rehabilitation
- ✓ Construction of trail-related support facilities and amenities
- ✓ Acquisition from willing sellers of trail corridors
- \checkmark Educational programs promoting trail safety and environmental protection

Illinois Bicycle Path Program



RESOURCES Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR)

Description: Provides grants to local governments for the development or rehabilitation of bike paths, or the acquisition of land for bike paths. Typical funded projects are improving access to existing bike trails, extensions of trails, and acquisition of land for new trails.

Local Project Examples: Des Plaines Park District received funding for a bike connection between two parks. The Village of Glenview received funding to replace asphalt on a bike path with concrete surface.

Award Sizes: The maximum grant award is \$250,000 for development projects. There is no maximum grant award for acquisition projects.

Eligible Phases: Loop trails are not eligible for funding except in certain large forest preserves. Funding is not typically awarded for Phase I or Phase 2 engineering.

Timing: The next call for proposals closes in March 2020.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 50%.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Land acquisition for development of a linear bike path
- ✓ Construction of new bike path
- ✓ Renovation/rehabilitation of existing bike path
- ✓ Bike path support facilities and amenities

Illinois Open Space Lands Acquisition and Development Grant



RESOURCES Program Sponsor: Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR)

Description: Provides funding to local governments for the acquisition and/or development of land for public open spaces. Typical funded projects include the acquisition of land for new parks, development of parks, and roadway improvements within parks.

Local Project Examples: DuPage County Forest Preserve District received funding for improvements to St. James Farm Forest Preserve; The Glen Ellyn Park District received funds for improvements to Ackerman Park.

Award Sizes: Each applicant agency is limited to \$750,000 of approved land acquisition costs and \$400,000 for development costs in any given year. Applicants are limited to one acquisition and one development project per year.

Eligible Phases and Limitations: All phases are eligible, but an award must only include those phase(s) that can be completed within a two-year period. Roadways within parks can be an eligible expense but roadway projects providing access to parks are eligible when the roadway only serves the park.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in May 2020.

Match Requirements: Most applicant must provide a match of at least 50%. Distressed communities can match as low as 10%.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Acquisition of land for park or open space purposes including trails
- Development of parks and open spaces including trails and certain park access roads

REGIONAL PROGRAMS

Local Technical Assistance and Community Planning Programs



CMAP Program Sponsors: Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP) and the Regional Transportation Authority (RTA)

Description: CMAP and RTA jointly sponsor these programs to provide assistance to local governments for land use and transportation planning initiatives. These programs provide in-kind assistance from the agency's professional staff and contracted consultants – no cash funds are provided to the awardees. Typical funded projects include comprehensive plans, transportation plans, Transit Oriented Development plans, corridor studies and implementation plans.

Local Project Examples: DuPage County and local communities received assistance with a planning study for Route 83. Aurora received assistance developing a Downtown Master Plan.

Award Sizes: There are no minimum or maximum awards – assistance is in-kind.

Eligible Phases and Limitations: Planning assistance only.

Timing: The call for proposals is typically held each fall.

Match Requirements: There is a sliding scale for required match. Applicants should contact CMAP for determination of their required match.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Bicycle and pedestrian-focused transportation plans
- ✓ GIS and data assistance
- ✓ Land use and transportation plans
- ✓ Local road safety plans
- ✓ Parking management and pricing plans
- ✓ Transit Oriented Development plans

Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality Improvement (CMAQ) Program



Program Sponsor: Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP)

Description: The program supports improvements to air quality through localized congestion relief, operational improvements, mode shift, and direct emission reduction. Typical funded projects include signal interconnects, transit service enhancements, traffic management control, access to transit improvements, and intersection improvements.

Local Project Examples: The Village of Glen Ellyn and City of Elmhurst both received funds for the reconstruction of Metra stations in their community.

Award Sizes: There is no minimum award size. The maximum award size is the programming allotment for one year.

Eligible Phases and Limitations: All phases except Phase I engineering are eligible.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in January 2021.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 20%.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Transit improvements
- ✓ Traffic flow improvements
- ✓ Bicycle facility improvements
- ✓ Direct emissions reductions projects

Transportation Alternatives Program (TAP)



Program Sponsor: Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP)

Description: The program supports improvements to non-motorized transportation with a focus on completing the Regional Greenways and Trails Plan. Projects submitted for funding in this program are also evaluated for funding in the bicycle facility category for the CMAQ Program. Typical funded projects include new access to existing trails, completion of gaps in existing trails, and new trail construction.

Local Project Examples: The Village of Lake Forest received funds for improvements to Robert McClory Bike Path. Funding for construction of the Cal-Sag Trail (south suburbs).

Award Sizes: There is no minimum award size. The maximum award size is the programming allotment for one year.

Eligible Phases: All phases except Phase I engineering are eligible.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in 2021.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 20%.

Eligible Project Types:

✓ Bicycle facility projects

Surface Transportation Program Shared Fund



Program Sponsor: Chicago Metropolitan Agency for Planning (CMAP)

Description: The program supports improvements that advance regional performance measures identified in CMAP's ON TO 2050 regional plan. This program aims to fund larger-scale, regionally significant projects. Typical funded projects include transit station reconstructions, improvements to major roadways, freight improvements, and rail-highway crossing improvements.

Local Project Examples: The City of Naperville received funding for a roadway reconstruction on North Aurora Road.

Award Sizes: There is a \$5 million-dollar minimum project cost, unless the application is submitted by a collaboration of three of more partners including at least one local government. The maximum award size is the programming allotment for one year.

Eligible Phases: All phases except Phase I engineering are eligible.

Timing: The next call for proposals is expected in January 2021.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 20%.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Road reconstructions
- ✓ Transit station rehabilitation/reconstructions
- ✓ Bridge rehabilitation/reconstructions
- ✓ Highway/rail grade crossing improvements
- ✓ Road expansions
- ✓ Bus speed improvements
- ✓ Corridor– level or small area safety improvements
- ✓ Truck route improvements

Surface Transportation Program Local Fund



Program Sponsor: DuPage Mayors and Managers Conference (DMMC)

Description: The program supports improvements to local roads and trails. Funded projects include intersection improvements, road re-constructions, resurfacings, and trail projects.

Local Project Examples: The Village of Hinsdale received funding for a resurfacing project on Chicago Avenue. The Village of Warrenville received funding for trail improvements.

Award Sizes: There is no minimum award size. The maximum award size is no more than 50% of the programming allotment for one year.

Eligible Phases: Only construction and construction engineering costs are eligible.

Timing: The 2020 Call for Projects takes places from January-March 2020. The next Call for Projects will take place in January 2022.

Match Requirements: The sponsor must provide a match of at least 25% for TCM projects and 30% for highway projects.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Highway Projects
 - Resurfacing or rehabilitation
 - Roadway reconstruction
 - Road widening/add lanes
 - Intersection improvements
 - Grade separations
- ✓ Transportation Control Measure Projects
 - Signal interconnects

PRIVATE SOURCES Community Grant



people for bikes Program Sponsor: People for Bikes

Description: The program supports projects that facilitate access to safe biking and encourage bicycling. Typical funded projects include programming to encourage bicycling, trail enhancements, placemaking initiatives on active transportation corridors.

Local Project Examples: The Chicago Park District received funding for Big Marsh Bike Park. Friends of the Cal-Sag Trail received funding to support planning of the trail.

Award Sizes: There is no minimum award size. The maximum award size is \$10,000.

Eligible Phases and Limitations: These grants do not use typical phases for transportation projects. Planning costs are usually not eligible.

Timing: There are 1-2 grant cycles per year. The next letters of intent are due on July 24, 2020.

Match Requirements: There is no required match.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Bike paths, lanes, trails and bridges
- ✓ Mountain bike facilities
- ✓ Bike parks and pump tracks
- ✓ End-of-trip facilities including bike racks, bike parking, bike repair stations and bike storage
- ✓ Bike advocacy projects

Doppelt Family Trail Development Fund



Program Sponsor: Rails-to-Trails Conservancy

Description: The program provides funds to build and improve multi-use trails with a focus on projects that are too small to meet minimum project size requirements of government programs. Typical funded projects include education and encouragement programs for trail projects, planning and design services for new trails, and small-scale construction projects.

Local Project Examples: Arlington Heights received funding for a multi-use path. Friends of the Cal-Sag Trail received funding for trail amenities.

Award Sizes: There are no minimum or maximum award sizes.

Eligible Phases: These grants do not use typical phases for transportation projects.

Timing: The call for applications is usually in the fall. Check program website for announcement of next opportunity.

Match Requirements: There is no required match.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Rail-trails
- ✓ Rails-to-trails
- ✓ Multi-use trails

AARP Community Challenge



Program Sponsor: AARP

Description: This program provides funds to make communities great places to live for people of all ages with quick-action initiatives. Typical funded projects include pop up demonstration projects, bus stop improvements, and education and encouragement programs for community livability initiatives.

Local Project Examples: The Rogers Park Business Alliance received funding to create a "People Spot" (public plaza). Chicago Department of Transportation received funding to install temporary parklets in parking lanes.

Award Sizes: There are no minimum or maximum award sizes. Most awards are less than \$5,000.

Eligible Phases: These grants do not use typical phases for transportation projects. Planning costs are typically not eligible. Costs for ongoing programming are typically not eligible, only for the development of new programming.

Timing: The call for applications is usually in the spring. Check program website for announcement of next opportunity.

Match Requirements: There is no required match.

Eligible Project Types:

- ✓ Creating vibrant public spaces
- ✓ Demonstrating the tangible value of "Smart Cities"
- ✓ Delivering a range of transportation and mobility options



Regional COVID-19 Update

As our state and nation continue responding to the pandemic, public transit remains an essential service, responsible for transporting health care employees, emergency responders, and retail workers to jobs throughout the region. We at the RTA remain committed to keeping elected officials and stakeholders up to date regarding COVID-19 impacts on transit and the region's response.

RTA publishes guide to riding transit again

As the Chicago region continues in <u>Phase 3</u> of Gov. JB Pritzker's Restore Illinois plan, the RTA, CTA, Metra, and Pace are preparing for some increase in transit ridership compared to when the "stay at home" order was in effect.

"<u>Ready to Ride Again? A guide for returning safely to the Chicago</u> <u>region's transit system</u>" gives five best practices for riding transit safely and information about how each transit agency is cleaning its vehicles, providing space for social distancing, and rebuilding confidence in the system.

No matter how you ride, remember:



Keep practicing pandemic hygiene: Wear a mask or face covering when riding. Wash your hands before and after traveling. Limit interaction with high-touch surfaces.

Social distancing still applies: Practice physical distancing by adhering to safe distance markers in stations and vehicles or staggering seating.



We're all in this together: Try to be patient and allow for extra travel time. Be willing to avoid crowded vehicles, wait for the next train or bus, or move to another rail car, if necessary.

Transit dashboard updated with new ridership, sales tax information

The <u>**RTA's COVID-19 dashboard</u>** has been updated with new information this week including ridership data for each transit agency as of June 5. The dashboard also now includes systemwide ridership compared to 2019, which as of this mailing is down 81 percent, and data on regional travel by all modes comparing June 5 to a day before the pandemic in March of this year.</u>

The dashboard also includes financial information including farebox revenue and sales tax receipts for recent months. New this week, sales tax receipts for the month of March show nearly a 15 percent decrease from the same month in 2019.

The Governor's Five-Year Economic Development Plan recognizes there are sites across Illinois with great economic development potential that require additional investment in order to become "shovel-ready." Redevelopment in infill locations can use vacant buildings, parking lots, empty schools, or other underused sites for new amenities and businesses near existing neighborhoods. The purpose is to provide funding for site preparation for underutilized properties that can transform into economic development opportunities across Illinois. (NOFO | <u>Guidebook</u> | FAQ)

Additionally, more than 90 percent of the courses also qualify for professional development hours (PDHs) that can contribute to continuing education and licensure renewal. Operations

In an effort to mitigate the spread of the coronavirus in the region, the Illinois Tollway temporarily implemented all-electronic tolling in March as a precaution to limit the potential spread of coronavirus to customers, as well as Tollway employees. All Illinois Tollway roadways remain open to traffic; however, mainline toll plazas, automatic toll payment machines, and both our customer call center and in-person customer service centers are currently offline.

The Tollway's maintenance staff, incident management personnel and HELP truck drivers are on duty to assist travelers, and toll collection has been entirely handled via I-PASS, E-ZPass and through the Tollway's online payment portal. All aspects of basic I-PASS account management, as well as cash customers' payment of unpaid tolls, can be done online at <u>www.getipass.com</u>. In addition, the tollway is currently holding the issuance of toll violations as well as the escalation of current notices.

In addition, the Tollway's Board of Directors has continued to meet virtually each month to keep all business and construction activity moving. At this time, we are continuing with our anticipated 2020 capital program spending, and our construction season is proceeding as planned.

Since the stay at home order began, passenger volume has swung widely, averaging 55% lower than expected during the first portion of the COVID-19 period. Similarly, commercial traffic has dropped as low as 20% below forecasted. And while there has been improvement, it is still too early to tell how the various phases of our recovery will impact traffic.

The net effect of this reduction in traffic has been a reduction in projected revenue of \$73 million through the end of April. The long-term impact on the agency is entirely contingent on the duration and economic impact of the pandemic; and with over 50% of revenue coming from commercial vehicles, the significance will further depend on a strong rebound in commercial traffic.

Construction

Across the nation, highway construction continues as an essential infrastructure activity, and Illinois is no different. The Tollway has proceeded with all construction projects as well as roadway maintenance and repair work systemwide. With safety as a top priority, the agency has worked closely with contractors to ensure the proper safety precautions

have been taken to protect workers engaged in outdoor construction activities along our system.

Tollway contractors and consultants continuing their work are always required to have comprehensive safety plans in place, and those plans have been updated to account for the safety precautions during the COVID-19 pandemic.

DuPage County construction projects:

- Reagan Memorial Tollway (I-88) Roadway pavement repairs between the Aurora Toll Plaza and Illinois Route 59 in Kane Counties and DuPage counties. A portion of the Prairie Path underneath I-88 remains closed with a detour into the summer.
- Veterans Memorial Tollway (I-355) noisewall replacement between Butterfield Road and Roosevelt Road is scheduled end of May through August.
- Central Tri-State Tollway (I-294) Project, mainline roadway construction and widening between the O'Hare Oasis and North Avenue.

CMAP Board Meeting (February 12th)

The CMAP Board held its regularly scheduled meeting. The Board approved CMAP's 2020 Federal Agenda and Surface Transportation Reauthorization Principles. The document provides Congress with CMAP's top policy priorities during the transportation reauthorization process. The Board also received a State Legislative Update.

Transportation Committee (February 21st)

The Transportation Committee held its regularly scheduled meeting. The Committee approved TIP Amendments 20-02, 20-02.1, and 20-02.2. Staff from Metra and the CTA presented on their 2020-2024 Capital Programs. The Committee also heard an update on the CTA Red Line South Extension as well as the Great Lakes Hyperloop Feasibility Study, which would link Chicago and Cleveland via Hyperloop technology.

CMAP Board Meeting (March 11th)

The CMAP Board held its regularly scheduled meeting. The Board reviewed CMAP's FY 2021 Budget and Workplan. The Board approved the FY 2021 Local Technical Assistance program of projects, which includes one project in DuPage County (Butterfield Road Corridor Plan in the Village of Lombard).

Council of Mayors Executive Committee (April 14th)

The CMAP Council of Mayors Executive Committee held its regularly scheduled meeting on April 14th. CMAP staff provided an update on the status of STP-L funding in FFY 2020, stating that several projects had dropped off the June IDOT letting, allowing all projects targeting the June letting to move forward. Additional, CMAP staff reported that there was no funding for STP-L projects in FFY 2020 beyond the June letting. The Committee also approved a process for allocating any additional funding that may come available in FFY 2020 to projects in Councils who had spent less during the three-year STP transition period. However, there is currently no additional STP funding for projects in FFY 2020.

STP Project Selection Committee (April 30th)

The April 30th STP Project Selection Committee meeting was cancelled.

CMAQ Project Selection Committee (April 30th)

The CMAQ Project Selection Committee held its regularly scheduled meeting on April 30th. The Committee approved several cost changes, including a cost increase for a DuPage County project (55th Street from Dunham Road to Clarendon Hills Road).

CMAP Board (May 13th)

The CMAP Board held its regularly scheduled meeting on May 13th. CMAP Executive Director Erin Aleman gave an update on CMAP's COVID Recovery/Stimulus principles, and CMAP staff solicited feedback from the Board on COVID-19 response and recovery. Staff also presented a brief legislative update.

CMAP Board (June 10th)

The CMAP Board held its regularly scheduled meeting on June 10th. CMAP Executive Director Erin Aleman stressed the importance of regional cooperation during the recovery period and to promote regional economic development. The FY 2021 Unified Work Program (UWP) was approved by the Board. The Board also approved two amendments to the ONTO 2050 Long Range Plan for interchanges on I-55 in Will County. Staff also presented a brief legislative update.

MPO Policy Committee (June 11th)

The MPO Policy Committee held its regularly scheduled meeting on June 11th. The Committee approved the FY 2021 Unified Work Program (UWP). The Committee also approved the allocation and distribution of CARES Act Funding to transit agencies in the Northeast Illinois and Southern Wisconsin regions. The amendments to the ONTO 2050 Long Range Plan for interchanges on I-55 in Will County were also approved. Staff presented a report on impacts from COVID to the region's transportation network, highlighting disparities in travel patterns between different socio-economic areas. The Committee also heard a Federal and State legislative update.
